

# **Executive Summary**

The state's vision is for every Front Range community to provide access to universal curbside recycling and compost collection for all residents in pursuit of a circular economy where waste is reduced and materials are reused, recycled, composted or otherwise put to beneficial and efficient use. Realizing this vision requires each community to take multiple steps to work toward zero waste. The Front Range Waste Diversion Enterprise (FRWD or board) provides grants and technical assistance to local governments, businesses, non-profits and schools located within or serving Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Denver, Douglas, Elbert, El Paso, Jefferson, Larimer, Pueblo, Teller, and Weld counties to help them achieve this vision.

Colorado's waste diversion goal for the Front Range is 39% by 2026 and 51% by 2036. Reaching this ambitious goal is critical to Colorado's economy, environment and health and will take active participation from every Front Range community, resident, and business. Reducing and diverting waste has many benefits, including:

- > Extending the useful life of current local landfills
- Creating local jobs, supporting regional businesses, and diversifying current and new end markets
- Increasing value for households by reducing wasted food, encouraging material reuse, and promoting recycling and composting
- > Addressing non-attainment and improving air quality by reducing greenhouse gas emissions
- Promoting wise use of natural resources

The Front Range Waste Diversion (FRWD) Enterprise Fund and board is not alone in this effort. In 2022, the Colorado General Assembly passed <a href="HB22-1159">HB22-1159</a>, which establishes Colorado's first Circular Economy Development Center; this legislation aims to empower Colorado businesses to manufacture new products using materials that Coloradans recycle. Also in 2022, the legislature passed <a href="HB 22-1355">HB 22-1355</a>, which sets up a Producer Responsibility program to provide recycling services free of charge to all residents in the state. Along with these efforts, FRWD partners with CDPHE's Hazardous Materials and Waste Management Division's Solid Waste and Materials Management Program and the Sustainability Program within CDPHE's Division of Environmental Health and Sustainability to align efforts and maximize resources.

While the adoption of FRWD and these new programs provides the tools needed to transform our state into a zero waste leader, Colorado still has a long way to go with a statewide diversion rate of 16% as of 2022. For our part, FY23 marks the third year of FRWD. We have made great strides in establishing a robust grants program that is delivering needed resources to Front Range counties, businesses, community-based organizations, and schools successfully implemented the board's FY22 priorities to begin providing direct support to Front Range communities. We are also promoting the availability of FRWD funds to support counties, and cities and towns interested in pursuing large, targeted tonnage reduction projects.

# FRWD Progress toward Goals in FY23

FRWD has facilitated the expansion of waste diversion capacity with existing partners. FRWD seeks to replicate, expand and augment collections, processing and end market capacity to address gaps in Front Range waste diversion and aversion. In FY23, FRWD increased proactive support to Front Range counties and municipalities by implementing two priority initiatives.

#### Priority 1: FRWD Ambassador

The FRWD Ambassador provides outreach and guidance to expand the number and diversify the breadth of applicants applying for the board's grant portfolio. Local governments, businesses, non-profits and schools can learn about FRWD grants through FRWD's revamped website managed by the Ambassador program and receive assistance when completing a grant application.

#### Priority 2: Technical Assistance Service Provider (TASP)

FRWD's new TASP program works directly with city and county governments by providing consulting and near-term planning services to help communities move up the zero waste ladder -e.g., by adopting municipal ordinances, setting up curbside recycling collections, or evaluating Pay as You Throw (PAYT) and volume-based pricing.

#### FRWD Grantee Work

Denver Compost Expansion through Denver Department of Transportation and Infrastructure - Local Government Compost Collection Project

\$2.3M to expand organics collection services in Denver. Funding will allow Denver Solid Waste Management to purchase compost carts for approximately 68,000 new compost customers over a three-year implementation period with the goal of enrolling primarily low-income residents with a subsidized service. Once implemented, this project is expected to divert 36,000 tons of organic waste annually from Front Range landfills.

#### FRWD Grantee Work

We Don't Waste - Food Rescue Project by a Nonprofit Organization (2-time grantee)

\$199,689 to expand food rescue and distribution along the Front Range. We Don't Waste used grant funds to increase food rescue and organics diversion efficiency by purchasing a walk-in freezer and food-transportation van; a refrigeration unit to replace an aging version on an existing truck was also funded. Diverted food resources were used to support food-insecure individuals through distribution to a network of non-profit agencies, along with We Don't Waste's own Mobile Food Markets.

\$149,897 to expand food rescue and food storage capacity along the Front Range with the purchase of expanded freezer equipment and expanded cooler equipment in We Don't Waste's new larger facility.

# Western Disposal Construction and Demolition (C&D) Sorting and Diversion Infrastructure Project - Business C&D Project

\$338,084 to increase diversion of C&D materials in Boulder, Broomfield, and adjacent counties. Western Disposal used grant funds to set up a C&D sorting and diversion center housed inside their new materials management center. This facility features a covered area with a segregated tipping floor, a presort area, and a sorting conveyor line with sorting stations. Beginning operations in March of 2022, the diversion center provides services to individual generators, contractors, developers, and haulers of C&D materials. Materials recovered include aggregates, metal, old corrugated containers, wood pallets, and lumber.







# Next Steps to Achieve Goals

FRWD has made progress creating and launching a Front Range grant program that is reaching and supporting a growing number of communities and zero waste practitioners. FRWD Board and staff are grateful for the many innovative partners in our existing network; we will continue to support and enhance their work, which is essential to the long-term sustainability of waste reduction and diversion. But FRWD also recognizes that we must continue to expand this network of communities, businesses, non-profits and schools engaged in zero waste activities, if we are to meet Colorado's waste diversion goals.

In the coming year, FRWD will use our Ambassador and TASP programs to conduct outreach to new audiences and provide support to interested communities. We will also invest in local infrastructure grants to enhance capacity to collect, process and remanufacture recyclable and compostable materials. FRWD will also look to collaborate with visionary leaders proposing innovative and impactful projects.

Investment in local infrastructure continues to be the priority. FRWD seeks visionary local leaders and businesses to utilize FRWD funds and expertise to increase capacity, improve access, and develop innovative solutions.

#### **Considerations Moving Forward**

- The economics associated with waste reduction and management, recycling and composting are complex; volatile commodity prices, difficulty siting facilities, high transportation costs, and supply chain delays are all real challenges.
- Coordinating with the new Circular Economy Development Center and the Producer Responsibility Program will enable FRWD to help address systemic gaps.
- > While the state's waste diversion goal targets municipal solid waste (MSW), FRWD's charge is broader than just MSW and also includes reducing and diverting construction and demolition waste, which also aligns with the state's vision.

#### A Continued Commitment to Integrity

As FRWD plans for the coming year, there are some commitments that are unchanged, particularly FRWD's continued commitment to integrity in our processes. FRWD promotes the use of the Municipal Measurement Program (MMP), which is a free tool to support data-driven decision-making by municipalities and counties. MMP is new for many Colorado communities, and FRWD and CDPHE staff continue to help work through data collection and confidence challenges. In the meantime, FRWD relies on the best data sets currently available, including self-reported data by grantees. The board also is committed to managing potential conflicts of interest in a transparent and rigorous manner. Board members disclose and recuse when their organizations are a topic of board business and the board is diligent in ensuring no single member's organization benefits unfairly. The board is also committed to transparent grant development and review to support a competitive grant process.

#### Support from the Legislature

The FRWD Board greatly appreciates the Legislature's many policy and financial investments in waste reduction and diversion, and has no proposed legislative or policy changes at this time.
